What you need to know about telepharmacy in Illinois

BACKGROUND: In 2010, the Illinois Board of Pharmacy implemented rules regarding the practice of telepharmacy. TelePharm has been used in pharmacies in Illinois since 2013.

What is telepharmacy?

Telepharmacy is the delivery of pharmaceutical care via telecommunications to patients at a distance, or in areas where they may not have access to a pharmacist.

There are 125 communities* in Illinois that could potentially lose their only local pharmacy.



Legislative overview

- No mileage restrictions for the location of a telepharmacy
- Each pharmacist at the home pharmacy may electronically supervise no more than 3 remote sites that are simultaneously open.
- The pharmacy technician located at the remote dispensing site must have one year of experience and be registered as a certified pharmacy technician, or be a student pharmacist.



There are **114** communities* located 10 or more miles away from the nearest pharmacy in Illinois. This presents a big opportunity for pharmacists.

How does telepharmacy work?

Think of a community telepharmacy as an extension of your current pharmacy. A retail telepharmacy is a licensed brick-and-mortar pharmacy staffed by one (or more) certified pharmacy technician(s). A pharmacist supervises the telepharmacy, or remote dispensing site, from a traditional pharmacy.
